

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

How do we know Developmental Assets matter?


More than three million teenagers across North America have had their Developmental Assets measured since 1989.





Kids with a lot of Developmental Assets are:

- 1. More likely to make positive choices
- 2. Less likely to get into trouble
- 3. More likely to bounce back form hard times





Of the 40 Developmental Assets, there are six Developmental Assets on Support.
